In Memoriam - Dr. Charles Menoche



Charles Paul Menoche

The members of ATMI fondly remember Dr. Charles Menoche, a long time ATMI member, presenter and attendee of ATMI conferences and gatherings, upon his recent passing, September 3, 2024.

Dr. Menoche was chair of the music department at Central Connecticut State University where he taught composition, electro-acoustic music, music technology, and directed the iPad ensemble. He completed his Doctor of Musical Arts at the University of Texas at Austin in 2002. Compositions by Menoche include works for voice, instruments, ensembles, and electro-acoustic media. His piece, "In the Machine," written for concert band, is published by Boosey and Hawkes as part of its Windependence series.

Daniel D'Addio, Professor Emeritus at Central Connecticut State University, reflects that "Charles' leadership in the Department of Music (at CCSU) was critical to its continued evolution and success!" Dr. Floyd Richardson of Tarleton State University was "privileged to call Charles a friend" and expresses, "He was brilliant, insightful, and caring. He was capable in many specialties in music. He will be greatly missed by those at ATMI, TI:ME, Central Connecticut, and in the greater community of musicians and educators."

Brian Kershner, Professor Emeritus at Central Connecticut State University, taught together with Menoche at Rutgers University where Menoche was hired to develop the music computer lab. Kershner recalls William Berz, the Chair of the Department, commenting "that one could not ask for more from a young faculty member."

After working together for 24 years, first at Rutgers and later at Central Connecticut State, Kershner reflects that Menoche was widely known for his kindness and generosity, for his possession of a broad and deep understanding of the music of our time, and great knowledge of electronic music and music technology. Kershner shares, "We have truly lost a remarkable man and colleague. We find ourselves in a diminished state without Charles Menoche."

One of Charles's favorite quotes, 'I can't go on, I'll go on,' from Samuel Beckett's *The Unnamable*, reflects the resilience he admired and embodied throughout his life. As his spouse, Tracey Rudnick shared, "Charles was very focused on living his life...and remained dedicated to the well-being of the students in his charge." Those who knew him will fondly remember the values he held close and the profound impact he had on those around him.
